Workshop Background Summary:

The Diplomacy Training Program (DTP) will organise a three-day workshop with some of the alumni of its human rights training programs over the last 30 years together with DTP partners – AIPP and MFA - and a small number of key Business and Human Rights (BHR) experts. The purpose of the workshop is to:

- Reflect on DTP BHR training and civil society BHR advocacy in Asia and the Pacific.
- Map DTP alumni connections to civil society networks and movements that have been working to advance BHR in the region if any.
- Connect Asian and Pacific DTP alumni to East Asian CSOs working on regional BHR
- Analyse the potential value, purpose and role of a new regional DTP alumni network in supporting civil society BHR advocacy.
- Potentially establish a steering group and identifying next steps for a regional DTP alumni BHR network.

DTP is an award winning independent NGO based in Sydney, Australia. DTP has developed and delivered human rights and advocacy training programs in the Asia-Pacific region and Indigenous Australia for over 34 years. These programs include DTP's Annual Human Rights and Peoples' Diplomacy Training Program, the longest running human rights capacity building course in the Asia-Pacific region. DTP has also delivered over 150 thematic and country-based programs for Asia-Pacific NGO/CSO leaders and HRDs.

Over more than 30 years, DTP has made a significant contribution to regional human rights. DTP's programs are organised with local and regional partners in human rights movements, and with DTP alumni. DTP's training methodology is participatory. Since 2004, DTP has developed and delivered programs on the following priority themes:

- Human Rights Defenders (HRDs)
- The Rights of Indigenous Peoples
- The Rights of Migrant Workers
- Human Rights and Business
- Children's Rights

In addition, it has developed programs on:

- Human Rights, the SDGs and Climate Change in the Pacific
- Myanmar
- With Diaspora Communities

DTP has a strong track record training BHR in Asia. From 2006-2011, DTP ran a dedicated BHR program and integrated BHR into its programs on migrant workers' and Indigenous Peoples' rights, including training participants working on disability, gender and LGBTQIA+. More recent BHR programs have focused

on the Pacific responded to a strong interest in climate justice, just transition, responsible investment and sustainable finance. Over 600 participants have attended at least one of these programs.

DTP recognises that the 3,500 plus alumni of DTP courses over the last 34 years contain a potentially powerful network of individuals and organisations committed to promoting and protecting human rights in response to these challenges.

DTP recognises the current context is very challenging for human rights defenders and human rights movements. DTP also recognises that the context is dynamic – new standards, new issues and new actors. As DTP looks to the future it is keen to make sure that its capacity building strategies support key human rights movements and complement the work of others.
