## **Trainer Biographies**

### **Siti Khoirun Ni'mah**

Siti Khoirun Ni'mah is the Executive Director of the International NGO Forum on Indonesian Development (INFID), a civil society network of over 70 NGOs advocating for democratic governance, human rights, and sustainable development in Indonesia and at the global level. She has extensive experience in policy advocacy, movement building and strategic engagement with government, parliament, international institutions, and grass-roots organisations. Her work focuses on promoting social justice through issues such as economic and political reform, business and human rights, climate justice, development financing, and inclusive democracy. Under her leadership, INFID strengthens the role of civil society in shaping public policy, amplifying marginalised voices, and ensuring accountability in national and international development processes.

### **Sri Palupi**

Sri Palupi is a researcher, co-founder, and former director with the Institute for Ecosoc Rights (Institute for Economic, Social and Cultural Rights) in Indonesia. She has worked for many years on issues at the intersection of human rights, development policy, natural resource governance, and corporate accountability, particularly in relation to the impacts of large-scale extractive industries and plantation expansion on local communities. Sri has contributed to research and policy discussions on business and human rights, environmental governance, and the protection of vulnerable communities affected by land use change and deforestation. Her regular engagement in civil society coalitions and public policy debates on environmental governance in Indonesia emphasises the importance of safeguarding that development policies respect human rights standards and strengthen community participation and accountability in decision-making processes.

### **Serena Lillywhite AM**

With over 25 years of advocacy experience in the not-for-profit sector, Serena Lillywhite specialises in business and human rights as well as corruption risks. Having lived and worked in the Asia Pacific region, Serena has witnessed firsthand the harmful impacts of large businesses on communities, particularly affecting marginalised groups such as Indigenous Peoples, women, and girls. Serena is a leading expert in the **OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises and Responsible Business Conduct** and is a member of the Governance and Advisory Board of the Australian National Contact Point (AusNCP). As a former CEO of Transparency International Australia, the leading anti-corruption NGO, Serena has contributed her knowledge and expertise in many DTP courses on Business and Human Rights and the Rights

of Indigenous Peoples. Serena has been awarded the *Member of the Order of Australia (AM)* in recognition of her work to promote responsible business conduct with NGOs such as Oxfam, Transparency International, OECD Watch, and the Brotherhood of St Laurence.

### **Anis Hidayah**

Anis Hidayah is the Chair of Komnas HAM, Indonesia's National Human Rights Commission. Anis was a dedicated human rights defender for the protection of migrant workers' rights for two decades before appointed to Komnas HAM. She was the Founding Executive Director of Jakarta based NGO Migrant Care, and in collaboration with Human Rights Watch, she documented how Indonesian female domestic workers in Malaysia, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait were severely exploited and abused. In addition, Anis helped build a broad network of Indonesian migrants' rights advocates to raise the profile of the abuses suffered by these workers and advocated successfully for Indonesia to ratify the UN Convention on the Rights of Migrant Workers and increased legal protections. In the leadership position at Komnas HAM, Anis is responsible for guiding the Commission's strategic direction, representing it both domestically and internationally, and overseeing investigations and recommendations on human rights violations across Indonesia.

### **Shin Young Chung**

Shin Young Chung is a public interest lawyer at Advocates for Public Interest Law, a non-profit organization of lawyers who assist vulnerable migrants. Shin Young is also a member of Korea Transnational Corporations Watch (KTNC Watch), a coalition of labor, environmental, human rights, and public interest law organizations that monitors and addresses human rights abuses by multinational corporations based in Korea. Shin Young has been actively engaged in research and advocacy through national and international human rights mechanisms for over 12 years. Her recent work has focused on investigating the human rights and environmental abuses of Korean companies in the supply chains of Korean investments in Indonesia, such as oil palm plantations and nickel mines, and urging the companies and the government to redress the harms they have caused throughout the supply chains.
